

IMPORTANT INFORMATION ABOUT YOUR DRINKING WATER
Monitoring Requirements Not Met for LOWER RIO GRANDE PWWA HIGH VALLEY Water System

Este informe contiene información importante acerca de su agua potable. Haga que alguien lo traduzca para usted, o hable con alguien que lo entienda.

Our water system failed to complete monitoring requirements for lead and copper during 2017 through 2019. Even though this was not an emergency, as our customers, you have a right to know what happened and what we are doing to correct this situation.

We are required to monitor your drinking water for specific contaminants on a regular basis. Results of regular monitoring are an indicator of whether or not our drinking water meets health standards. During 2017 through 2019 we did not complete all monitoring requirements for lead and copper and, therefore, cannot be sure of the quality of our drinking water during that time.

What should you do?

There is nothing you need to do at this time.

The table below lists the contaminants we did not properly test for during the last year, how often we are supposed to sample, how many samples we are supposed to take, how many samples we took, when samples should have been taken, and the date on which follow-up samples will be taken.

What is being done? [Describe corrective action.] The Lower Rio Grande PWWA High Valley water system will collect five (5) lead and copper samples between June 1, 2020 and September 30, 2020. Samples for the violation per period were collected and are available for review, the results are within the parameters, but the incorrect system name and system number were entered on the forms.
